ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This house is an example of the Swiss chalet variation of the California Bungalow style. It has the shingled walls, spreading gable roof with exposed rafters and purlins, and projecting second storey porch with exposed structural elements typical of the Western Stick Style. The house is a storey and a half tall, set on a concrete foundation that ranges from low on the north side to high on the south side because of the slope of the land. The walls are covered with wooden shingles stained dark brown, with burnt orange trim. The ridge of the medium-pitched gable roof (not low-pitched enough for a true Western Stick Style) is south of center, so that the roofline is lower on the north side of the house and the gable is centered, not over the whole facade, but over the porch that covers the southern three-quarters of the facade. The roof is covered with composition shingles and has deeply projecting eaves and verges with exposed rafter ends and rafter-like purling. There is a low and wide shed-roofed dormer centered on the south slope with a band of three 6-light casement or hinged-sash windows, and a large gable-roofed dormer on the north slope. A massive exterior chimney on the north side, constructed of random river stones with a single weathering, serves a lrage stone fireplace in the livingroom. Most of the windows are paired 8-light casement with plain trim. There are also a few double-sash, l-over-l light. There is a large square window at the north end of the facade with 6 vertical lights in its short upper sash and a single light in its larger lower sash. The southern half of the facade is recessed at the first level; and a porch, with a second storey balcony projecting beyond it. covers the southern three-quarters of the facade. It has exposed Western Stick Style framing elements. The first level porch floor is concrete on a fieldstone foundation, and two fieldstone pedestals accent the recession in the facade. There is a pair of 10-light French doors, flanked by single casement windows, at the south end of the facade. The main entrance is at the north end of the porch, in the section of the facade that it not recessed. Access to the second storey balcony is by a pair of French doors flanked by single casement windows centered under the fable. There is also a tiny casement window at each corner of the gable. There is a one-storey rear wing, not original, but matching in nearly all details.

Gardner L. Carter purchased two lots in Gildersleeve Wood in 1923 (City DB 44-2) and built two houses there the same year, according to tax records. (He owned several lots there and redivided them and is said to have built four houses.) Beirne and Marian S. Lay bought this house in 1931 (DB 73-409) and sold it in 1946 to Persis B. Bacon (DB 123-417), who sold the next year to Truman and Irene Southall (DB 132-244). They sold the house to Langdon and Audrey H. Hankins in 1955 (DB 183-105), then bought it back in 1960 (DB 218-189) and sold it the next year to his sister Nell S. Short (DB 226-458). Dr. W. Copley McLean bought it from her estate in 1972 (WB 14-560, DB 335-450) and sold it to Elizabeth L. Winter in 1975 (DB 367-326). She died in 1979 (WB 23-166), but the house is still occupied by her sons.


