## ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This small white weatherboarded cottage was probably originally a vacation cottage at Fry's Spring. It is 1½ storeys tall, three bays wide, and single pile, with a one-storey rear wing which was probably added soon after the cottage was built. It is set on brick piers which were later filled in with stone and a basement dug out. The original section is set on a low foundation, but the land slopes so that the basement under the wing is above ground at the rear. The cottage has a steep gable roof with an additional central gable on the facade. It has projecting eaves and verges and shaped rafter ends. The original standing-seam metal has been replaced with gray-green composition shingles. The wing has a hip roof. There are two small capped brick interior end chimneys at the rear of the original section, one serving a large fieldstone fireplace. Windows at the first level are double-sash, 2-over-2 light, with plain trim and solid shutters. Second level windows in the gables are shorter and triangular-headed, 3-over-3 light. These windows and the steep gable roof give the cottage a Gothic touch. A one-storey entrance porch covers the central bay of the facade. It has a nearly flat roof covered with composition shingles, chamfered posts with brackets, and a spindle frieze with pierced panels above the brackets. There is no balustrade. The 4-paneled entrance door has a one-light rectangular transom. The center bay of the original section projects on the rear elevation to accommodate the 2-flight stair in the central hall. The projection is now surrounded by the 2-bay rear wing and is visible only as a windowless dormer. A first level window still remains between the projection and the wing, showing that the wing is a later addition. There is a covered deck with Chinese Chippendale balustrade across the rear elevation of the wing. A small addition and basement-level porch fill in the SW rear corner of the cottage. Shed roofs slope to both the west and south.

There is a small weatherboarded cottage, now used for storage, in the back yard. It is two storeys tall with a onestorey side wing and has a steep shed room covered with composition shingles. A one-storey porch with a segmentalarched frieze (enclosed at one end) covers the 2-storey section. There are small 2-light casement windows. The interior is unfinished.

## HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

D. R. Snow purchased a lot a block west of the Jefferson Park Hotel in 1898 (ACDB 111-117). Tax records indicate that he had probably built the cottage before receiving a deed. It may have been used oridinally only for summer vacations. The rear wing was added before 1920. Kenneth F. & Virginia E. Herndon bought the house in 1939 (City DB 98-16, 99-65) and made some alterations in the 1940's. They dold it to John V. Graham in 1977 (DB 387-507)
