CALL TO ORDER

Council met in regular session on this date with the following members present: Ms. Galvin, Ms. Szakos, Mr. Bellamy, Mr. Fenwick, Mr. Signer.

AWARDS/RECOGNITIONS & ANNOUNCEMENTS

Ms. Szakos read a proclamation in recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, recognizing the work of the Shelter for Help in Emergency (SHE) in their 37th year of operation.

Mr. Signer read a proclamation in recognition of the Focused Ultrasound Foundation, founded by Dr. Neal Kassell. Dr. Kassell was present to accept the recognition.

Ms. Galvin announced the City is holding sessions to seek input for the efficiency study on October 18th, from 7:30pm – 9:00pm and on October 19th from 11:30am – 1:00pm, both at the Carver Recreation Center.

She also announced the RWSA put out a publication recently with information about the reservoir, which may be found online at www.rivanna.org.

Ms. Szakos announced the Street Pavement Management Program report is available from the Public Works Department. Also, students are encouraged to walk to school on Wednesday, October 5 in honor of International Walk to School Day. For more information, go to www.walkbiketoschool.org, or www.charlottesville.org/bikeped. She also announced CAT Route 2 has started from Downtown to the new 5th Street Station. Go to the CAT website for more information about the new route.

Ms. Szakos announced the Drewary Brown Bridge ceremony on Tuesday, October 11 at 11:30 a.m. She announced the honorees. Please call 434-970-3115 for more information.

Mr. Signer announced Mayor's Office Hours on Thursday, October 6 from 12:00pm – 1:00pm at the Grit Café on the Downtown Mall. Please contact Paige Rice to reserve a spot. Also, this Wednesday at 4:15 p.m. at CitySpace, the Secretary of the Commonwealth will present a voting education and restoration assembly with Mayor Signer and Vice Mayor Bellamy. He announced the deadline for registering to vote is October 17. The Registrar's Office will hold special hours on Saturday, October 15. Absentee voting is currently underway during regular office hours and the three Saturdays prior to Election Day. Go to www.vote.virginia.gov to apply online.

Mr. Bellamy recognized the new principal of Charlottesville High School and thanked him for attending. He announced the City Services Fair is being held on Friday, October 7 from 10:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. at the City Hall Plaza.

Mr. Bellamy announced Dr. Matt Shields of Charlottesville High School received the 2016 Yale Educator Award. He was nominated by former student Chris Hayes, who now attends Yale. Dr. Shields was present to accept the recognition.

Mr. Fenwick announced the Blue Ribbon Commission is meeting this Thursday from 6:00pm – 8:00 p.m. at Clark Elementary School. He also said "First Folio" is a Shakespeare exhibit currently at UVA this week.

CITY MANAGER RESPONSE TO MATTERS BY THE PUBLIC

Mr. Jones responded to Ms. Schmidt's concerns regarding calls for service at the recent Pride Festival. The Pride Festival organizers said they were satisfied with the interactions they had with the police. Mr. Smith's concerns about the studies regarding speed on Locust Ave. were posted on the NDS Website, but there are no recommendations to increase the speed limit. Mr. Jones confirmed that we will encourage speakers to use the microphones.

MATTERS BY THE PUBLIC

Mr. Paul Reynolds said Councilors have an opportunity to add to the safety and well-being of the people of Charlottesville. Del. Toscano said he would be willing to support permission for

speed camera use at the upcoming legislative session. He outlined the benefits of implementing such a tactic in the City.

Ms. Jeanne Chase, 223 Old Lynchburg Rd., said residents of Charlottesville can no longer use their streets with confidence outside of their vehicles. The volume and speed of traffic on their streets have increased steadily over the years. She said she supports Mr. Reynolds' proposal for use of automated speed cameras in the City.

Ms. Rebecca Quinn, 104 4th St., thanked Frank in Public Works for following behind the trash pick-up with humor and grace. There is a lack of attention and responsibility by mostly restaurants, some businesses, and residents regarding trash. The City, CVACB, and DBAC should remind restaurant owners of the rules on a quarterly basis. She said the City should change how trash is collected on the Downtown Mall; charge property owners directly for improper trash protocol. She suggested civil citations for businesses that repeatedly break the rules.

Mr. John Pfaltz, 1501 Rugby Rd., said traffic is a problem in our City and is getting worse. He said they lost the sale of their house at 1503 Rugby Rd. because there is too much traffic. The residential speed limit should be 25 mph on all streets. Speeding cameras work. He said three minutes is more than enough time for speakers; do not make it longer.

Ms. Laurie Talbot, and her son Emanuel, 1423 Ricky Rd., said she rents a space for her salon at 503 W. Main Street. This is a registered Virginia landmark, and the current landlord is negligent. This has resulted in significant flooding and damage to the space she is renting. The owner has said he will not re-plumb the building.

Mr. Brian Wimer, 712 Graves St., Exec. Dir. of the IX Art Park, gave an overview of what has been happening since they opened in spring 2014, including several community and non-profit events.

Mr. Peter Kleeman, 407 Hedge St., said he continues to be disappointed about reduced communication between Council and members of the public. He encouraged all Councilors to meet with the public on designated days. All members should be allowed to work with the community, not just the mayor.

Mr. Bellamy said it is often difficult for him to meet during the day because he is a school teacher. He thanked the mayor for making himself available to engage with individuals in the best way he can. He recognized speeding as a serious issue in the City, and he welcomed a conversation about having cameras in the community to address safety issues as well.

Ms. Szakos said e-mail is a good way to easily access all City Councilors. She said Councilors are usually available to meet with people when needed. She said a good, thorough cleaning of the alleys helps them stay cleaner for longer. She said Councilors usually do not comment because most of the remarks are directed at staff.

Ms. Galvin said she is available on e-mail and responds to many of them on a daily basis. She asked Mr. Jones to address the traffic issue, which was also a major issue at the recent Our Town meeting at Venable Elementary. Mr. Jones said staff has had several conversations with Chief Thomas about enforcement around the City. Speed cameras are on the list to discuss with Sen. Deeds and Del. Toscano and will be coming back to the Council for consideration before the legislative packet goes to the General Assembly. The recent Streets That Work initiative is anticipated to help as well. Mr. Jones clarified that this request would simply be to get authority to use speed cameras, but further discussion about possible implementation would take place.

Mr. Signer said the mayor has discretion while running meetings. He explained that meetings with lighter agendas, such as this evening, may be run in a more relaxed manner. He explained the reasoning for the Council's response rules as written. He said he speaks for himself during the Mayor's Office Hours and does not purport to speak for Council on the whole.

Mr. Fenwick asked Ms. Pethia about the bid process for projects. Ms. Jacobs explained AHIP's bidding and procurement process. Volunteers are also used.

Mr. Signer said he has been on the AHIP tours and often uses the good work done as an example of the City's wonderful organizations.

Ms. Galvin suggested that the City's seal be placed on signage where possible.
