

HARLOW HOUSE

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This two-story, two-bay, brick four-square, laid in running bond, has a hipped roof covered with standing-seam metal. There is a hip-roofed front dormer, clad with clapboards, and an interior chimney of brick. The roof is edged with a boxed cornice above a narrow frieze board. The windows are four-over-one, double-hung wood sash, with jack arches over the first-floor windows, paired four-over-one units on the first floor of the front facade, and paired four-light windows in the dormer. There is a one-story, two-bay, Craftsman-style front porch with a hipped roof, supported on large wood pylon posts on brick piers. There is a rear section with a brick first floor and a wooden sleeping porch on the second-floor level. The foundation is raised at the rear of the house, and is plastered. The house stands on a small sloped site with a low brick wall along the front and southwest side of the front yard, which contains small cedars and pines.

HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

In 1854 Nancy Kinney, a free black woman, was deeded a half-acre lot on Ridge Street by her mother, Eliza Kinney, who had purchased the property the year before (ACDB 52-186, 53-157). Over the next few years, Nancy Kinney bought two adjoining tracts of land (ACDB 55-367, 56-129). After her death, her daughter Sally K. Carey sold the property in 1917, while retaining a life estate (City DB 31-12). The 1853 and 1854 deeds stated that there was "a two-story framed or log house" on the property. The 1920 Sanborn map shows what appears to be that house located on the site of 705 and 709 Ridge Street. H. Gary Clarke bought the entire tract in 1923 (DB 44-285), subdivided it, and apparently demolished the old house. He sold the 705 lot the same year to M. B., Thomas W., and Leslie B. Harlow (City DB 45-167). Tax records show that the house was built in 1930, the same year that it was deeded to Ida B. (Mrs. M. B.) Harlow (DB 73-78). It remained in the Harlow family for a half century (DB 140-140, WB 27-692) before being sold to Melvinia P. Hamilton in 1985 (DB 464-368). It has always been owner-occupied.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is a good example of a simple four-square dwelling, in excellent condition with a high level of integrity. In style, materials, form, and scale it is compatible with the other contributing resources in the District.




