

Certificate of Appropriateness Application BAR 18-06-09 501 Park Street Tax Parcel 530012000 Owner: Hospice of the Piedmont Applicant: Griffin Cottrell **Landscape and site elements**



The house was used as a single family residence for decades, and more recently a group home for adults (Rosewood Manor).

<u>October 2002</u> - The applicant came to the BAR with a preliminary concept for Hospice of the Piedmont renovations, including demolition of the side/rear porch to provide a new side entrance and patient room. At that meeting concern was expressed over how the handicap ramping would impact the front of the site.

<u>November 2002</u> - BAR 02-11-36 was approved unanimously as submitted with the understanding that all details that are not proposed, that were not spoken to at the meeting and were not discussed, would come back to the Board. Final BAR approval was required for: siding materials for the addition; window and door details for the addition; roof shingles for the addition; and detailed species information for all new plantings. At that time the proposal included: demolition of the rear porch and addition of a patient room and elevator; a series of accessible sidewalks to the existing front porch and new side porch on Hedge Street; and a garden on Park Street for patients and their families. A color scheme and the use of fiber plank were proposed. The applicant expressed intent to take the plan to the neighborhood association, and would come back if their concerns were large (see attached letter).

<u>April 15, 2003</u> - Applicant requested approval of the roof, windows and siding. The BAR unanimously approved the painted wood windows, hardy plank siding and panel system, and the asphalt shingle roof (the roof is currently asphalt shingles). The BAR would expect to see a site plan and plantings when available.

<u>May 20, 2003</u> - The BAR voted 6-0 to approve the landscape plan as submitted. The site plan may be approved by staff unless it varies significantly.

May 18, 2004 - Approved unan. change in materials of HC ramp to wood as submitted with note that applicant has offered to change paint to dark green to match gable ends of house.

<u>October 21, 2014</u> - The BAR accepted (7-0) the applicant's request for deferral. BAR suggestions to consider included: Scaled drawing; radiating design so pavers fit oval; shredded hardwood mulch; specify kind of edging between pavers and planting bed (how would the planting bed edge be stabilized?); two-



tier fountain would be lower but still provide sound; consider leaving the oval unoccupied, pushing the planting to the exterior of the oval walkway.



Application

The applicant is requesting the landscaping around the pedestrian walkway at 501 Park Street, currently used as Hospice House. The applicant wants to design this space to be a memorial garden, featuring assorted plants benches, and mulch beds with the intent of providing an enhanced pedestrian experience. The applicant is submitting this application as their Eagle Scout project.

Criteria, Standards, and Guidelines

Review Criteria Generally

Sec. 34-284(b) of the City Code states that,

In considering a particular application, the BAR shall approve the application unless it finds: (1) *That the proposal does not meet specific standards set forth within this division or applicable*

- provisions of the Design Guidelines established by the board pursuant to Sec.34-288(6); and
- (2) The proposal is incompatible with the historic, cultural or architectural character of the district in which the property is located or the protected property that is the subject of the application.

Pertinent Standards for Review of Construction and Alterations include:

(1) Whether the material, texture, color, height, scale, mass and placement of the proposed addition, modification or construction are visually and architecturally compatible with the site and the applicable design control district;

(2) The harmony of the proposed change in terms of overall proportion and the size and placement of entrances, windows, awnings, exterior stairs and signs;

(3) The Secretary of the Interior Standards for Rehabilitation set forth within the Code of Federal Regulations (36 C.F.R. §67.7(b)), as may be relevant;

(4) The effect of the proposed change on the historic district neighborhood;

(5) The impact of the proposed change on other protected features on the property, such as gardens, landscaping, fences, walls and walks;

(6) Whether the proposed method of construction, renovation or restoration could have an adverse impact on the structure or site, or adjacent buildings or structures;

(7) When reviewing any proposed sign as part of an application under consideration, the standards set forth within Article IX, sections 34-1020 et seq shall be applied; and

(8) Any applicable provisions of the City's Design Guidelines.

Pertinent Guidelines for Site Design

B. PLANTINGS

Plantings are a critical part of the historic appearance of the residential sections of Charlottesville's historic districts. The character of the plantings often changes within each district's sub-areas as well as from district to district. Many properties have extensive plantings in the form of trees, foundation

plantings, shrub borders, and flowerbeds. Plantings are limited in commercial areas due to minimal setbacks.

- 1) Encourage the maintenance and planting of large trees on private property along the streetfronts, which contribute to the "avenue" effect.
- 2) Generally, use trees and plants that are compatible with the existing plantings in the neighborhood.
- *3)* Use trees and plants that are indigenous to the area.
- 4) Retain existing trees and plants that help define the character of the district, especially street trees and hedges.
- 5) Replace diseased or dead plants with like or similar species if appropriate.
- 6) When constructing new buildings, identify and take care to protect significant existing trees and other plantings.
- 7) Choose ground cover plantings that are compatible with adjacent sites, existing site conditions, and the character of the building.
- 8) Select mulching and edging materials carefully and do not use plastic edgings, lava, crushed rock, unnaturally colored mulch or other historically unsuitable materials.

Discussion and recommendation

Staff recommends approval.






Project Description and Benefit

Briefly describe your project.

I will be landscaping and planting a memorial garden at the Hospice of the Piedmont Hospice House. This will include a variety of plantings, placement of benches, and memorial plaques. In front of the Hospice of Piedmont house there is an existing paved sidewalk in the shape of an oval. I plan to use this existing oval as a container for my garden. Currently there is grass in the middle of this oval. I plan to clear the grass on the inside of the oval for four feet, leaving two openings. One opening will be at the top and one will be at the bottom (as pictured below). I will use an assortment of different plants and bushes in these areas. I will also place two stone benches in this garden. The benches will be parallel to each other near the foci of the oval (see in photo). I will leave grass in the center of the oval, but I will seed it to make it more lush.



Materials
