Haden's plat included numbered streets (1st through 5th) between each block, which did not survive as streets but are still extant in the form of unpaved alleys. Most lots in Haden's Addition were 65' x 145'.

This house is located on the west side of the street on a relatively flat lot. A grassy lawn surrounds the house and a concrete sidewalk extends along the front of the property. A paved driveway on the north side of the property leads to a gravel parking area behind the house.

Primary Resource Description: This two-story, three-bay-wide dwelling is set on a brick (painted) foundation is clad with stucco (gunnite), and is covered by a side-facing gable roof of standing-seam metal. The front elevation holds a centrally located entrance consisting of a five-panel wooden door with multi-pane sidelights and transom. Windows are six-over-six wooden sash. The three-bay front porch, which is accessed by a set of concrete steps, is raised on concrete and brick piers and is covered by a metal-clad hipped roof that is supported by square supports that have been clad with gunnite. A wooden handrail with cutwork balusters extends between the supports. A three-sided bay window is present on the first floor level on the north end of the house; a pair of one-over-one windows on the second floor is detailed with a wooden surround featuring a pedimented cap. The south end elevation holds a single six-over-six window on the first floor.

The two-story, gable-roofed ell that projects from the back of the house is flanked on the south by a one-story, shed-roofed wing and on the north by a wooden deck, which is accessed by a pair of French doors. Windows on this section of the house include two-over-two and six-over-six sash.

<u>Significance Statement:</u> This resource is located on the eastern half of Lot 2, Block 6 of Haden's Addition. Both lots on this block were purchased around 1905 by O. A. Bradshaw. This resource is an example of the dwellings constructed in Belmont during the early twentieth century. It is typical in form and materials and has limited original architectural detail. Although it does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.


This resource, located on the west side of the street, post-dates the dwelling on the east half of the lot, and likely dates to about 1950. Two sheds are located at the back (west) of the lot.

<u>Primary Resource Description:</u> This one-story, four-bay by three-bay dwelling is set on a concrete block foundation, is clad with asbestos shingle siding, and is covered by a side-facing gable roof of asphalt shingles with a concrete flue extending from the rear slope. Windows are one-over-one wooden sash. The dwelling is accessed on the north end via a centrally located entrance accessed by a set of concrete steps. A shed-roofed, screened-in porch on the east side also provides access to the house.

<u>Secondary Resource Description:</u> Shed I: This one-story shed is of concrete block construction and is covered by a metal-clad shed roof. An entrance and a wide, board-up opening are present on the east side of the building. The shed may have been used as a chicken house. Shed II: This one-story, frame shed is set on a concrete slab foundation, is sheathed with plywood boards, and is covered by a shed roof of asphalt shingles. A pair of swinging doors accesses the building on the east side.

Significance Statement: This resource is located on the western half of Lot 2 of Block 6 of the Haden Addition. Both lots on this block were initially purchased by O.A. Bradshaw around 1905. This resource is an example of secondary dwellings that are often seen behind larger, primary houses in the Belmont area. The resource may have been constructed around 1950 as a garage (depicted on the 1950 Sanborn map) and later converted to a living unit. It is typical in form and materials and has limited original architectural detail. The resource reflects the changes that occurred in the Belmont neighborhood during the last half of the twentieth century, as many residences were rented or divided into apartments. Although this resource does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.

Windows are one-over-one replacement sash. The three-bay front elevation holds a centrally located entrance that features side lights with wooden panels below and a multi-pane transom. The one-story, three-bay front porch, which is raised on brick piers with horizontal wooden slats between them, is covered by a metal-clad hipped roof that is supported by square wooden post supports. A slender handrail with square balusters extends around the porch. A three-sided bay window is present on the first floor level of the north elevation; a single one-over-one window is located on the second floor level and is detailed with a pedimented surround. A one-story, gable-roofed wing extends from the south end of the house. The back (west) elevation

holds a two-story, gable-roofed ell and a series of one-story gable- and shed-roofed additions. At present, the house is divided into several living units, resulting in the construction of additional entrances at the rear of the house.

Secondary Resource Description: Shed: This small, frame garden shed, located at the end of the gravel driveway, is set on a stacked stone foundation, is clad with board-and-batten siding, and is covered by a front-facing gable roof of asphalt shingles. It is similar in form and some details to the house built at 205 Douglas Avenue. Although it does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.

Haden's plat included numbered streets (1st through 5th) between each block, which did not survive as streets but are still extant in the form of unpaved alleys. Most lots in Haden's Addition were 65' x 145'.

This property, located on the east side of Douglas Avenue, slopes to the northeast. The parcel is encircled by a wire fence. A few trees and shrubs are planted in the yard. A gravel-surfaced drive accesses the property on the south side.

Primary Resource Description: This two-story, frame dwelling is clad with a stucco finish (gunnite) and is covered by a low-sloped, hipped roof of asphalt shingles. The three-bay front elevation holds a centrally located entrance that is flanked by two-over-two replacement windows. The hip-roofed front porch, which extends across the full width of the front elevation and around the north side of the house, features turned post supports with curved brackets. No railing is present. A two-story, hip-roofed ell projects from the back of the house and holds a concrete block flue on the rear slope of the roof. Originally, a two-story, open porch was inset into the south elevation of the house. The porch has been enclosed with shiplap siding on the first floor. The upper floor retains its porch supports and railings, but is enclosed with plastic sheeting. A shed-roofed bulkhead is present on the north side of the ell.

<u>Secondary Resource Description:</u> This one-story, concrete block garage, located behind the house, is covered by a front-facing gable roof of asphalt shingles. The gable ends are clad with vertical board siding and hold a window opening in each end. A wooden plank door is located on the west end of the building and a small sliding window is present on the

north side. The building is depicted on the 1929 Sanborn map adjacent to one of three garage structures on the property. This building does not appear to have had any openings large enough for a garage, and likely served another purpose.

Significance Statement: This dwelling is located on Lot 1 of Block 10 of Haden's Addition. The lot was initially purchased by Mrs. A.L. Walker around 1905. Local records indicate a construction date of 1906, which would make this one of the early houses built in the newly platted addition. Because the area was not yet annexed into the city, Sanborn maps do not depict this area at that time; however, the form of the house appears to confirm this date. Modifications to the house include application of a stucco finish and the enclosure of the formerly open side porch. Later Sanborn maps show several garage buildings along the south side of the property. This resource is an example of the dwellings constructed in Belmont during the early twentieth century. It is typical in form and materials and has limited original architectural detail. Although it does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.

<u>Site Description:</u> Douglas [Douglass] Avenue was platted in 1905 as Haden's Addition to the Belmont neighborhood and extended from the Lyman property on the north to Monticello Road on the south. E.G. Haden platted the area, which he had acquired from Mrs. Jane Ellen Lyman and her husband (Charlottesville Deed Book 16:342), into 12 blocks with two lots each, except the first and seventh blocks, which had three lots each (Charlottesville Deed Book 17:53). Haden's plat included numbered streets (1st through 5th) between each block, which did not survive as streets but are still extant in the form of unpaved alleys. Most lots in Haden's Addition were 65' x 145'.

This parcel, located on the east side of Douglas Avenue, slopes steeply to the east. The front yard is enclosed by a chain link fence, which extends to part of the rear yard. The rear yard is heavily overgrown with vegetation. A gravel driveway that leads to the adjacent property extends along the north side of the parcel.

Primary Resource Description: This one-story, Ranch-style dwelling is set on a concrete foundation, is clad with brick (running), and is covered by a side-facing gable roof of asphalt shingles. A large brick chimney is located on the rear slope of the roof. Windows are two-over-two, horizontally divided wood sashes. The four bays of the front elevation are asymmetrically arranged, with the entrance and two flanking window bays grouped to the south end of the building. The window bay south of the entrance currently holds two, one-over-one windows set within a larger opening that is filled with vertical wooden siding. This bay may have originally held a picture window. The metal-clad shed roof that extends over the concrete entry porch is supported by plain wooden posts. A wooden deck extends from the back of the house. Because of the slope of the lot, the basement level is above grade at the back of the dwelling. It appears that a former garage opening at the basement level has been modified and French doors installed. At present, the house is divided into two living units.

<u>Secondary Resource Description:</u> This outbuilding, located on the east end of the property, was not observed during the present survey due to thick vegetation. The building appears on aerial photos, and is believed to have been built at the same time as the dwelling.

Significance Statement: This dwelling is located on Lot 2 of Block 10 of Haden's Addition. Although the lot was sold around 1905 to W.H. Cloud and C.H. Andrews, no building appears on the property until the 1957 construction of the present Ranch style dwelling. The house is typical of mid-century Ranch dwellings with its horizontal form, limited detailing, and large brick chimney. The house is representative of the type of infill construction that occurred in the neighborhood in the late 1950s and 1960s. Although the property does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.

<u>Site Description:</u> Douglas [Douglass] Avenue was platted in 1905 as Haden's Addition to the Belmont neighborhood and extended from the Lyman property on the north to Monticello Road on the south. E.G. Haden platted the area, which he had acquired from Mrs. Jane Ellen Lyman and her husband (Charlottesville Deed Book 16:342), into 12 blocks with two lots each, except the first and seventh blocks, which had three lots each (Charlottesville Deed Book 17:53). Haden's plat included numbered streets (1st through 5th) between each block, which did not survive as streets but are still extant in the form of unpaved alleys. Most lots in Haden's Addition were 65' x 145'.

This property is located on the east side of Douglas Avenue. The house is set some distance from the street and does not maintain the setback of other houses in the area. This house may have been moved to this location, or may predate the subdivision in this area. The parcel is heavily wooded and is accessed by a gravel drive.

<u>Primary Resource Description:</u> This two-story, frame dwelling is set on a brick foundation, is clad with weatherboards, and is covered by a metal-clad side-facing gable roof with a cross gable centrally located at the front. The three-bay front elevation holds a centrally located entrance with sidelights that is flanked by six-over-six windows. A three-sided bay holding two-over-two windows is present on the south end of the house. The full-width front porch is covered by a shed roof that is supported by turned wooden posts.

A large two-story, gable roofed addition projects from the back of the house and projects over the front gable roof. The ell is set on a concrete foundation, is clad with weatherboards, and the roof is clad with asphalt shingles. A concrete flue projects from the main roof of the house, through the front eave of the ell. The basement level of the ell is above grade due to the slope of the land.

Secondary Resource Description: Shed I: This tall, one-story frame shed, located on the north edge of the property behind the house, is set on concrete block piers, is clad with T-111 siding, and is covered by a shed roof of asphalt shingles. Swinging doors are located on the west end of the building and a lean-to extends from the south side. Shed II: This one-story, frame shed--possibly prefabricated--is located at the east end of the property behind the house. The building is clad with vertical wooden boards, is covered by a metal-clad, front-facing gable roof and holds sliding doors on the west end.

Significance Statement: This dwelling is located on Lot 1 and a portion of Lot 2 of Block 11 in Haden's Addition. The house does not maintain the setback of other houses on the street, which may indicate that it predates the subdivision. S.W. White is listed as the purchaser of both lots on this block around 1905. The house is depicted on the 1913 Sanborn map with a one-story addition at the back. On the 1929 map, the house is depicted at the northeast corner of Holly Street SE and South Street (one of Haden's platted streets). It is not known when these streets ceased to exist in this area. At present, the property is only accessed from Douglas Avenue. The dwelling is a traditional I-house form with later additions. Although it does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.

This dwelling is located on the east side of Douglas Avenue on a lot that slopes to the southeast. The dwelling is set close to the street sidewalk with landscaped beds situated in between. A brick walkway leads to the front porch of the house. An unpaved path extends past the north side of the house towards the outbuildings located at the back. Very large, mature trees are present on this property.

<u>Primary Resource Description:</u> This two-story frame I-house is clad with a stucco finish, is set on a brick foundation, and is covered by a side-facing gable roof of standing-seam metal. The three-bay front holds a centrally located entrance (replacement door) with sidelights and a single-light transom that is flanked by one-over-one windows. The one-bay, hip-roofed entrance porch features corner supports of tapered wooden columns set on a stucco-clad piers. The porch floor is paved with flagstone. A three-sided bay on the north end of the house holds one-over-one windows. Maps indicate that an L-shaped wing has historically projected from the back of the house; other shed- and gable-roofed section have been added over the years. The one-story, rear gable-roofed ell holds a large exterior stucco-clad chimney on the south side.

<u>Secondary Resource Description:</u> Garage: This recently constructed, one-story garage is clad with stucco and is covered by a front-facing gable roof of crimped metal. Wooden swinging doors are located on the west end of the building. **Domestic Outbuilding:** This one-story outbuilding, located east behind the garage, is clad with a stucco finish and is covered by a side-gable roof of crimped metal. Window openings are present on all sides of the building and an entrance is located on the south side. The building's use could not be determined.

Significance Statement: This house is located on Lot 2 of Block 11 of Haden's Addition, which was purchased around 1905 by T.H. Bradshaw. The house is depicted on the 1913 Sanborn map and likely was built between 1905 and 1910. A one-story rear wing is depicted on the house and the north end bay window also is shown. Subsequent additions appear to have been made to the rear of the house and it has been clad with stucco. This resource is an example of the dwellings constructed in Belmont during the early twentieth century. Although the dwelling does not possess sufficient architectural or historical significance to qualify for individual listing in the National Register, it is a contributing resource to the Belmont Neighborhood Historic District.

Lyman at this time of Haden's Addition. At present, new multi-family residential development is located on the property. This dwelling is oriented facing south. The fenced yard is heavily landscaped with trees, shrubs, and planting beds.

<u>Primary Resource Description:</u> This two-story, frame dwelling is set on a brick foundation, is clad with synthetic siding (Bricktex that has been painted), and is covered by intersection gable roofs of asphalt shingles. Two interior brick chimneys are present on the rear (north) slope of the roof. The entrance porch, which is raised on wooden piers, is covered by a shed roof of standing seam metal that is supported by plain wooden square posts. An extension of the porch, located on the west side of the cross-gable wing, is enclosed with screen. The three-bay front elevation (south) holds a centrally located entrance door with sidelights and transom and flanking six-over-six windows. The cross gable wing is clad with board-and-batten siding and is set on a parged foundation.

<u>Secondary Resource Description:</u> This one-story, frame garage, located north behind the house, is clad with T-11 siding and is covered by a front-facing gable roof of asphalt shingles. A metal flue pipe projects from the north slope of the roof.

The wide, garage door opening on the west end of the building has been enclosed with vertical board siding and an entrance door.

<u>Significance Statement:</u> This dwelling is located on Lots 1 and 2 of Block 12 in Haden's Addition. Around 1905, these lots were purchased by Bettie W. Goolsby. Likely built in the late nineteenth or early-twentieth century, the house reflects a vernacular L-shaped plan with limited architectural detailing. Local records give a construction date of 1875 for this property, which predates the establishment of the Belmont neighborhood.
