Summary of Meeting Notes:

- Review of Habitat's Tax Deferral Proposal Overton McGehee:
 - Looking to get it approved this year, intent was to keep it simple and flush out the details more thoroughly during the year.
 - Review of the existing City Tax Deferral program(s)
 - o Review of the proposal that Overton handed out
 - Discussion of people preferring a rebate over a deferral, and whether or not this can be incorporated into the proposal.
 - Questions raised during discussion:
 - 1. What happens if the house is sold to another low-income family/household?
 - 2. Does this proposal apply to university students?
 - 3. How will institutional lenders help/hinder the use of this program?
 - 4. Is this set up as a lien on the property? And if so, could the City send letters to local lenders alerting them of the liens?
 - 5. Could the levels of the property tax be reduced instead of having the deferral?
 - 6. What is this proposal going to cost the city?
 - 7. Does the \$25,000 income cap rise over time with cost-of-living increases?
 - 8. Would families/households apply each year? Income reverified?
 - 9. How long does the application process take?
 - 10. How accessible are our current programs? How many people called to inquire vs. how many people actually followed through with application?
 - Overton made a motion to revise the deferral program into a rebate program instead. Income less than \$25,000. House value less than \$230,000. Qualify for a rebate of \$500.00 or an amount worth one-quarter of taxes whichever is lower.

- Noah seconded the motion. Committee unanimously approved proposal with a vote of 11-0.
- Staff will send recommendation on to Gary for his review and approval.
- Discussion of Affordable Housing Conference Natasha Sienitsky:
 - Natasha circulated an outline of her initial ideas/research for the conference. Based largely on a HUD conference she attended in New York.
 - Work to bring together public/private/non-profit organizations
 - HUD funds are currently available to fund a regional conference in our area, and a group called Newport Partners will work with HUD to help us organize
 - Date originally booked for March 23rd after more discussion, sounds like we'll need more time to pull everything together. New date is TBD.
 - Current sponsors include: CAAR, PHA and the UVA Planning Department
 - Looking for additional community/stakeholder input
 - Need to find an accessible community location to host the event. Possibility of the university not being an ideal location in terms of how the community will view the conference.
 - Look to further the dialogue with university bring them on-board as part of the conference.
 - Want to include broad enough topics to get a variety of speakers/participants to the table.
 - Questions raised during discussion:
 - 1. What are the overall goals/objectives of this conference?
 - 2. What can be accomplished by the event?
 - 3. What about focusing on things we are already doing in the community bringing them to greater attention?
 - 4. How to go after major employers to get them to sponsor the event?
 - 5. Do we want to get buy-in from our surrounding counties?
 - Natasha is looking for any and all assistance in helping put this conference together.
 - Item will be first on our next agenda for further discussion
