ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This is a picturesque two-storey Victorian house with Queen Anne massing and simple Eastlake detail. The walls are covered with weatherboarding, broken by horizontal bands of vertical siding above the water table, below the woodenshingled pent-roof between the storeys, and below the cornice. The weatherboarding is now painted a cream color with chocolate-brown trim. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with standing-seam metal and has a woodenshingled gable with attic windows over the projecting bay on each side of the house. There are two interior chimneys with corbelled caps. The rear additions are faithful to the original section in most details. Windows are single-light, double-sash, with plain trim. There is a simple one-storey semi-octagonal bay window, with nearly flat roof and simple cornice brackets, on the Wertland Street side. Ornamentation is confined to the porches and the projecting pavillion on the 14th Street facade. There is a shallow one-storey rectangular bay window, with a window bordered by small tinted glass lights and flanked by narrower windows. The lower sash of the single matching window above has been replaced with a plain one. The Eastlake gable ornamentation includes a pendant and curved brackets and a decorated panel below the attic windows. The small entrance porch and vestibule, tucked into the southwest corner of the house, are covered by a very steep shed roof with gouged ornamentation applied to its half-gable end. The Eastlake detail is continued in the balustrade, posts with sawn brackets, and spool frieze with pendants. A small second-storey balcony is set into the porch roof. It has a steep gable poof with simpler ornamentation, supported on large sawn brackets. The balustrade matches that of the porch below. The entrance door, beneath a rectangular transom, has a large light bordered by small tinted glass lights above six small panels. The vestibule is lighted by three small, eight-light, fixed-sash, tinted glass windows. The floor plan is irregular, with a central hall on the second level, but none on the first level. A double-flight, open-well staircase with stick style balustnade rises from a side stair hall, with separate flights rising from the landing to the original part and to the rear addition. Windows and doors have moulded trim with corner blocks. The three fireplaces with coal grates have been closed.

HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

In 1891, L. A. King purchased Lot #16 of McKennie's Addition from J. C. McKennie who had bought it from his father's estate, but had not received a deed (City DB 2-318). The 1892 tax appraisal shows a new building on the property. This was probably erected by King in 1891, although tradition says that the house was built in 1875. King had a greenhouse and florist shop in the next block, at the location later occupied for half a century by Page Florist. In 1921 King's heirs sold the house to A. M. E. Runkle, who operated a rooming house there (DB 38-476). He apparently added a second storey to the original rear wing, added a side entrance, and possible re-arranged the staircase. He sold it in 1958 to Goldie M. Allen, Sue Allen Ball, and Frances S. Halliday, three sisters who had apparently managed the rooming house during Runkle's ownership and continued to operated it under the name of "The Runkle House" (DB 208-285). Joe H. McMurry purchased the house in 1969 after the last of the sisters had died, and sold it in 1974 to Russell C. Williams who has restored it and rents it to students (DB 309-209, 355,499).

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in 1891, the King-Runkle House is one of the most intricately detailed Victorian-period houses left in Charlottesville. Of special note are its Queen Anne massing, contrasting surface materials, and the use of intricate Eastlake detail on the porches and in the gables. These elements have remained essentially intact through many years' use as rental property. It is listed individually on the National Register of Historic Places as a part of the Charlottesville Multiple Resource Area. Its prominent location and its fine Victorian detailing make the King-Runkle House a very important part of the architectural fabric of the City.

The commercial development of the first block of Fourteenth Street has increased the prominence of this house in the neighborhood. The King-Runkle House and the house across from it now mark the gateway to the residential area, emphatically stating the transition from a decidedly late-20th-century part of the Corner to the late-19th-century Preston Heights subdivision.

Guero aroue manung & army This, very picturesque Wiskarianxhausexwith 2-storey Victorian house with Eastlake details is irregularly shaped with projecting bays on all sides. The walls are covered with weatherboarding broken by hand horizontal bands of vertical planking above the wooden water table , below the wooden-shingled pent-roof between the stories, and below the cornice. The weatherboarding is now painted buff with chocolate-brown trim. The steeply-pitched gable roof is covered with standingseam tin and has a wooden-shingled gable with attic windows over the projecting bay and has a simple boxed cornice. There are two interior chimneys with corbelled caps. The several rear additions are faithful to the original section in most details. Windows are single-light, double-sash, with plain trim. There is a simple one-storey semi-octagonal bay window, with nearly flat roof and simple cornice brackets, on the Wertland Street side. The Eastlake ornamentation is confined to the porches and the projecting pavillion on the 14th Street facade. There is a shallow rectangular bay window with a low pediment at the first level, with a window Jwith each sash bondered by small panes of stained glass and flanked by narrower, windows. The lower sash ef the single matching window at the second level, has been replaced with a plain and pene of glass of The peak of the gable is decorated with gouged scrollwork and pendant, and therare several rows of below the attic windows.

A very steep shed roof cover the small entrance porch and vestibule (which looks as if it might have been enclosed later from part of the porch) tucked into the southeast corner of the house. The Eastlake detail is continued in its balustrade, posts with brackets in a sunburst design, and spoel frieze with pendants. A small second-storey balcony is set into the steep shed roof over the entrance porch. It has a steep gable roof, with simpler turned decorational its peak, supported on harge sawn brackets. The balustrade matches that of the porch below. The interior floor plan is irregular

The entrance door has a large pane of glass bordered by small panes of stained glass above six small panels. There is a single-paned rectangular transom. The vestibule is lighted by three high, 8-light, fixed-sash, stained-glass windows. The interior floor plan is irregular, with a central hall on the second level, but none on the main level. A double-flight, open-well staircase rises from a side stair hall, with separate flights rising from the landing to the original part and to the rear addition. Windows and doors have moulded trim with corner blocks. The three fireplaces baxashe with coal grates have been closed.

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
