ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This 21/2 storey house was altered almost beyond recognition when its veranda was removed and its weatherboarded walls were covered with asbestos shingles, but it still has the Mansard roof and central entrance tower which characwalls were covered with asbestos shingles, but it still has the Mansard roof and central entrance tower which charac-terize the Second Empire style. As originally built, the house was three bays wide and single pile with a 2 1/2 -storey central rear wing. A 1-storey veranda covered the facade. Twelve years later a large 3-storey rear addition was built extending the original wing south beyond the main block and wrapping around its SW corner. The veranda was extended around the SE corner to meet the addition. Over the next few years, another complex of back porches and additions was built beyond the others. In the 1920's the Mansard-roofed main block was extended to the south as far as the addition. It was left open at the first storey level, but that was later enclosed also. The house is set on a low foundation. The central block is 2 1/2 storeys tall and now four bays wide. Its gabled Mansard roof is covered with standing-seam metal, painted green, and has a boxed cornice with returns. There is an interior chimney on each side of the central hall. The square, three-storey, Mansard-roofed entrance tower projects from what was originally the center bay of the facade. A cornice between the second and third levels suggests that upper walls may originally have been of a contrasting material, such as wooden shingles. The paired entrance doors have one may originally have been of a contrasting material, such as wooden shingles. The paired entrance doors have one light over a short panel, all with Eastlake rails. Paired 15-light French doors at the second level give access to the flat roof of the entrance porch. There is a pair of narrow windows at the third level. The veranda that originally covered the facade has been replaced by a 1-bay entrance porch at the base of the tower. Pairs of chamfered square posts with sawn brackets support a flat metal roof with simple roof balustrade. An awkward stair rises across the facade, covering a window. The concrete floor of the entire veranda remains. Windows throughout most of the house are double-sash, l-over-1 light, with plain trim. Those at the first and second levels are the same height; the dormers at the third level are somewhat shorter. The original rear wing is 2 1/2 storeys tall with a steep bellcast gable roof and an interior end chimney. Ceilings are shorter than in the central block. The large addition south of this is three storeys tall and has a nearly flat roof. There is a bowed bay window at the south end at the second and third levels. Interior trim is symmetrically moulded with corner blocks. The entrance hall has a moulded plaster cornice and decorated frieze. An arch supported by decorated Corinthain pilasters separates it from the stair hall behind it. A 2-flight open-well stair, now partially enclosed, continues to the third level. It has square newels and Eastlake balusters.

HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

A. N. Peyton bought Lot 18 in McKennie's Addition in 1894 (City DB 5-186). He had contracted two years before to buy Lot 17, but did not receive the deed to that until 1899 (DB 9-290). Tax records show that this house was built in 1894 and that substantial additions were made in 1906. Miss Dora B. Landes bought the house in 1918 (DB 31-438) In 1894 and that substantial additions were made in 1900. Miss bora B. Landes bought the house in 1918 (UB 51-458) and sold it to Ernest R. and Emma R. Duff in 1926 (DB 55-63). They divided it into 3 apartments immediately and into six apartments in the early 1930's. When they sold it to Goldie M. Allen and Sue Allen Ball in 1949, the deed referred to it as the Hillcrest Apartments (DB 142-242). The house was covered with asbestos shingles in 1958 and an outside stair on the facade was built in 1969 (DB 309-209) and sold it to the present owners in 1979 (DB 407-126). SIGNIFICANCE This is one of only three examples of the Second Empire style in Charlottesville.

Three-Story Apartment **House Burns**

A fire that sent flames gushing from third-story windows of a 14th Street Northwest rooming house burned out of control for more than three hours Friday night while worried residents numbly watched their belongings go up in flames.

Firefighters and residents said they were able to confirm at 11:30 p.m. that no one died in the fire.

Bright orange flames engulfed the top floor of three-story frame building minutes after the blaze was reported at 7:07 p.m.. The fire quickly spread to lower floors, bathing the street in an eerie glow and drawing crowds of spectators from the nearby University of Virginia Corner.

The fire at 205 14th St., N.W., was brought under control shortly before midnight, authorities said this morning.' A large house a few feet away was saved.

Officials estimated damage from the blaze at \$100,000. The top floor of the building was destroyed and the second floor completely gutted. The first floor sustained severe smoke and water damage, authorities said at 12:30 a.m.

The rooming house, with seven apartments on three floors, had more than a dozen residents.

Two first-floor residents said they were able to knock on the dears of the building's seven apartments shortly before finefighters arrived. "They told us they believe everyone got out," said Gary Pleasants, a city police officer.

"I saw at least a half-dozen people running out the front door when I arrived," said Sgt. C.E. Jones, the first officer to arrive. "I went to grab a fire extinguisher and go after it, but it didn't take

long to see there was no way to stop it."

Charlottesville Fire Chief Julian Taliaferro said firefighters had time to search the lower two floors, but said the top floor was burning too severely to complete the search.

Jeff Megginson and James Clatterbuck, two second-floor residents, said they were able to haul two television sets from their apartment before firefighters shooed them out of the building.

They stood helplessly across the street, shivering in a cold, steady drizzle as the remainder of their clothing and other property burned.

"There it goes," said Clatterbuck, as the second-floor ceiling collapsed into his room on the southeast corner of the building.

"It makes you sick. And to think, we just spent all that money buying groceries today," said Meg-ginson. "When we were in there, smoke was already coming through the ceiling. We just didn't have time to get anything else.'

The two residents of the rooming house said most of their fellow tenants "were out partying" when the fire started.

The blaze - the most spectacular city fire since Reid's supermarket burned on the downtown mall Thanksgiving Eve, 1982 caught city firefighters on a busy night. Tahaferro said firefighters had responded to a dozen less serious calls, including a reported gas leak, in the hour preceding the alarm.

Soon after the fire was reported, another engine company was called to the UVa Hospital emergency

room when hospital officials thought there might be a fire.

David Haugh, a hospital night administrator, said smoke from the 14th Streeet fire several blocks to the north was so thick that hospital personnel thought their building was burning.

Although UVa property was never in danger, the rooming house fire did confront city firefighters with serious problems. Another old rooming house stood only a few feet to the south of the burning building.

Firefighters trained streams of water on the neighboring building while residents watched apprehensively. "Oh God, just get that fire out. That's our house," said one young woman, who declined to be identified.

A one-story building about 20 feet to the north also was evacuated because of the danger of spreading fire and falling embers. Residents stood outside gossiping and guzzling beer while they watched the fire.

About an hour after the blaze

was reported, flames shot high above the building as the fire burned through the roof. Knots of spectators — some carrying pool sticks from the nearby T.J.'s pub — gasped as the flames heightened.

"We were down at Sophie's when we started hearing all the commotion," said one. "I looked out the window and saw what seemed like thick fog. I thought, 'Fog, big deal.' Then, it seemed like every fire truck in the city came by. I thought this might be worth checking out."

Once the fire burned through the roof, most of its fury was directed upward, helping firefighters save neighboring buildings.

Taliaferro said firefighters would be unable to prepare a damage estimate until sometime today. "There won't be much left of the building, that's for sure," he said.

Caroline Taliaferro, a part-owner of the rooming house who is not related to the fire chief, said she has no idea how much the structure was worth.

"I have no figures," she said. "I do know it was an old Victorian

that at one time was known as the Ball Mansion. It's been an apartment house for years and years."

F.C. Taylor, a volunteer firefighter, said the property just north of the rooming house was the scene of a fire about 20 years ago that claimed the lives of seven people. "That used to be an old rooming house too," said Taylor, a city firefighter for 31 years.

As the firefighters worked, Wade Turner, a fourth-year UVa philosophy student, searched for his cat, Pepper, after determining that Nesbit, his other cat, was outside.

He said he had left the rooming house shortly before 7 p.m. to take his wife to work and returned to find the building in flames.

"Pepper's a 14-year-old cat. I'm afraid he's still in there somewhere," Turner said, then gave a shout of relief when he saw the cat leap from a downstairs window nearly an hour after the fire started.

"I don't know what he was doing in there all the time," Turner said. "I'm just glad he got out."

Meanwhile. Turner's wife had

rushed home from work with concerns of her own when she heard the couple's building was on fire.

Jill Turner gave her husband a bear hug when she located him standing in a driveway next door to the burning building. "I've never been as happy to see anyone in all my life as I am to see you," she told Turner.



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
