ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION shaped
This late 19th century two-storey weatherboarded house on a low brick foundation was enlarged and modernized in 1975. Originally it was L-shaped: a 3-bay, single-pile Virginia I-house with a 2-storey rear wing. Later a one- storey wing was added behing the original wing. In 1975 the latter was enlarged to two storeys and extended beyond the width of the original wing connecting it to the main section. The result is an irregularly (shapted)2-storey house. It is painted pale yellow with white trim. It has a low-pitched gable roof with an additional central gable, and the rear wing's roof continues as a shed roof over the side extension. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles and has projecting eaves and verges, boxed cornice with returns, and a wide cornice board. There is a capped interio en chimmey at the north end of the front section and another chimmey between the front section and the original wing Some of the original double-sash, 1-over-1 light windows with plan trim remain, but those on the facade have been replaced with single-light casement windows. There is a pair of windows in each side bay of the facade. Windows at the second level are somewhat shorter. A one-storey entrance port covers the central bay of the facade. It is medium hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles and has a central gable and boxed cornice with returns. It is supported by four chamfered square posts with iron pipe railing. The original porch floor has been replaced with brick. The 4- paneled entrance door has 3-light sidelights over panels and a 4-light rectangular transom. There is an open deck at the rear of the house.
HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION
In 1891 the heirs of Dr. James A. Leitch deeded the northern portion of the Leitch-Munday lot to James S. Leitch (City DB 3-29). Tax records show that he built this house the following year. It remained in the Leitch family for 40 years before being purchased by the Charlottesville Perpetual Building and Loan Co. in 1932 (DB 76-298). J. H. and Lucy H. Irving bought it in 1935 (DB 85-10), and used it as rental property, as did Dr. Charles W. Hurt who bough it in 1966 (DB 273-551) and Don E. Burch who bought it in 1974 (DB 354-23). Eric M. and Bertie D. Heiner bought the house in 1975 (DB 363-116), enlarged and totally renovated it, and sold it to the present causes in 1978 (DB 396-551)
