My dear Mr. Calrow:-

In this letter I am replying to a number of things brought out in your recent letters and also the prints.

I The elevation study transmitted to me under date of October 30, has received very careful study. I will not go into details about this elevation scheme at present but I may venture the following comments:

a Dr. Lambeth with whom I have discussed both the interior and exterior arrangements for this building feels that the elevation scheme would work out very beautifully but feels with me doubt as to whether the lighting scheme would be satisfactory. Mr. Michie, Chairman of the School Board, feels this way with us.

b Dr. Lambeth and I both feel that we ought to have extended porches similar to those at either Venable or McGuffey schools. It is true that the Wren type of building that your study carries out is of the limited city type. Dr. Lambeth who has studied many of Wren's buildings, where the site permitted, says that he used an extended porch type also. Dr. Lambeth has been over to Venable school with me and has gone over everything with great care. His opinion is that Venable is a thing of beauty and convenience both as to the interior and exterior of the building as well as the grounds. He and I are doing a great deal in the way of putting out shrubbery to still further beautify the grounds. I realize that these comments are hardly germaine to what we are talking about and yet they are essential parts of the larger scheme for school development.

c I am anxious to see your Colonial study.

d I think that we ought to use every effort to vary the Venable and McGuffey exterior scheme somewhat but at the same time, as you say, we can come back to these schemes and get a successful building.
