### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This is a two-storey warehouse with a partial basement and a partial attic, whose windows make the facade three stories tall. It is built of brick laid in five-course American bond and painted white on the facade and sides. It has a nearly flat metal shed roof behind a plain parapet. The facade is four bays wide. There are doors in the first and fourth bays at the first level, the eastern one giving access to the apartments above. There is a multi-light stationary window in the third bay, and a multi-light garage door of equal size, with a door in the middle of it, in the second bay. Windows at the second storey and attic levels are single-paned, double sash, arranged in segmental-arched pairs with wooden sills and no surrounds. At the attic level, the glazing is also segmental arched. There are no attic windows except on the facade. Second-storey windows on the side elevations are functionally arranged. The rear elevation facing the railroad is seven bays wide. Windows are double-sash, six-over-six light. Those at the second level are somewhat shorter, and the ones in the 2nd, 4th, and 6th bays replace doors. At the first level, a large warehouse door is flanked by two windows on each side. There is a basement garage.

#### HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

Rufus W. Holsinger purchased this property in 1913 (City DB 24-470). Two years later he tore down the two-storey brick house on the site and built this warehouse. It shared a spur track of the C & O Railroad with T.P. Carver's Coal and Wood Yard next door. H.A. Snyder bought the building from Holsinger's estate in 1932 (DB 78-13) and sold it to C.R. Thomas in 1935 (DB 85-197). The present owner bought it from his estate in 1975 (DB 363-368). Over the years, the building has been occupied by Standard Produce Co. (wholesale fruits and vegetables), two automobile dealers, Norcross Transfer & Storage, and a furniture repair business. In recent years the main level has been partitioned into two smaller units. It is vacant at the present time. The four second-storey apartments are also vacant:

#### SIGNIFICANCE

Rufus Holsinger, a noted local photographer at the turn of this century, built this warehouse across from his studio in 1915 to take advantage of the railway spur behind the building and the increasingly busy traffic on West Main Street. The building is a good example of an early 20th century vernacular warehouse, and is the only one of its type along the West Main Street corridor.


