## ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This structure is a middle class interpretation of the larger high style town houses found at the Hughes House (Market Street) or the Abell-Gleason House (521 North First Street). As with the above mansions, the Hodges-Gleason House is decorated with pilasters applied to a two storey, three bay brick building. The scale of the house, which is only one room deep, is domestic rather than grand. The entrance porch is an example of later Victorian design and was undoubtedly added after the Civil War.

## HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

John H. Bibb purchased a 2½-acre lot opposite his home of Ridge Street (Bibb-Wolfe House, 505 Ridge Street) for \$300 in 1852 (ACDB 50-270) and sold it to James M. Hodges in 1859 for \$500 (ACDB 58-340). On the same day, Hodges gave a deed of trust for \$2600 on this "house and lot nearly opposite the residence of E. M. Wolfe" to R. T. W. Duke, trustee for Helen S. Morris (Mrs. Wm. M. Morris) (ACDB 58-337 & 443). Tax records show that the house had been built in 1857. Thus, Hodges apparently built the house before receiving a deed to the lot. The house changed hands several times between 1862 and 1864 before being acquired by John T. Barksdale (ACDB 59-683, 60-285, 61-166). He sold it to Henry A. Darrow in 1868 (ACDB 63-160). James Alexander wrote in 1874 that Darrow's "pretty residence" had been built by Hodges and later owned by Morris. Thomas M. Farish bought the house in 1885 (ACDB 84-430) and sold it in 1887 to James E. Gleason, whose family owned it until 1946 (ACDB 88-370; City DB 77-388; 129-383). The house has had several owners since then and has been used as rental property, except for the years 1947-49 when it was owned and occupied by R...H. Marsh (DB 131-367, 143-102). Ronald Thompson bought it in 1973 (DB 352-60).

Brief Architectural Description of Primary Resource:

This three-bay, single-pile, two-storey house on an English basement is a vernacular interpretation of the high style Greek Revival detached town house in the pilastered style. Walls are constructed of brick laid in eight-course American-with-Flemish bond. It has a low-pitched hipped roof covered with standing-seam metal with deeply projecting eaves, a boxed cornice, and a plain, deep frieze. There are two interior end chimneys. Windows are double-sash, 6-over-6 light, with architrave trim. Basement and second storey windows are shorter. The wide one-bay Victorian veranda was probably added around the turn of the century. It has a nearly flat hipped roof covered with standing seam metal. It has projecting eaves with a boxed cornice, chamfered posts with scroll brackets, and a Colonial Revival balustrade. The entrance in the central bay of the facade has paneled pilasters, 4-light sidelights over panels, a 3-light rectangular transom, and corner lights. Above the entrance, a second-storey window is flanked by paneled pilasters and narrow, sidelight-sized double-sash windows, and all three have paneled spandrels. A series of wooden

additions and enclosed porches covers the rear elevation. 1987: The rear additions were replaced in 1985 with a two-storey weatherboarded wing covering the northern two bays.

#### SIGNIFICANCE & RELATION TO EVALUATION CRITERIA

Built in 1857, the Hodges-Gleason House is an elegant vernacular version of the high style Greek Revival town house in the pilastered style. Its front entrance and the tri-partite window arrangement above are nicely detailed, as is the somewhat later Colonial Revival verandah. This house is one of the most important in the Ridge Street Historic District, and it has been individually designated as a local historic landmark.

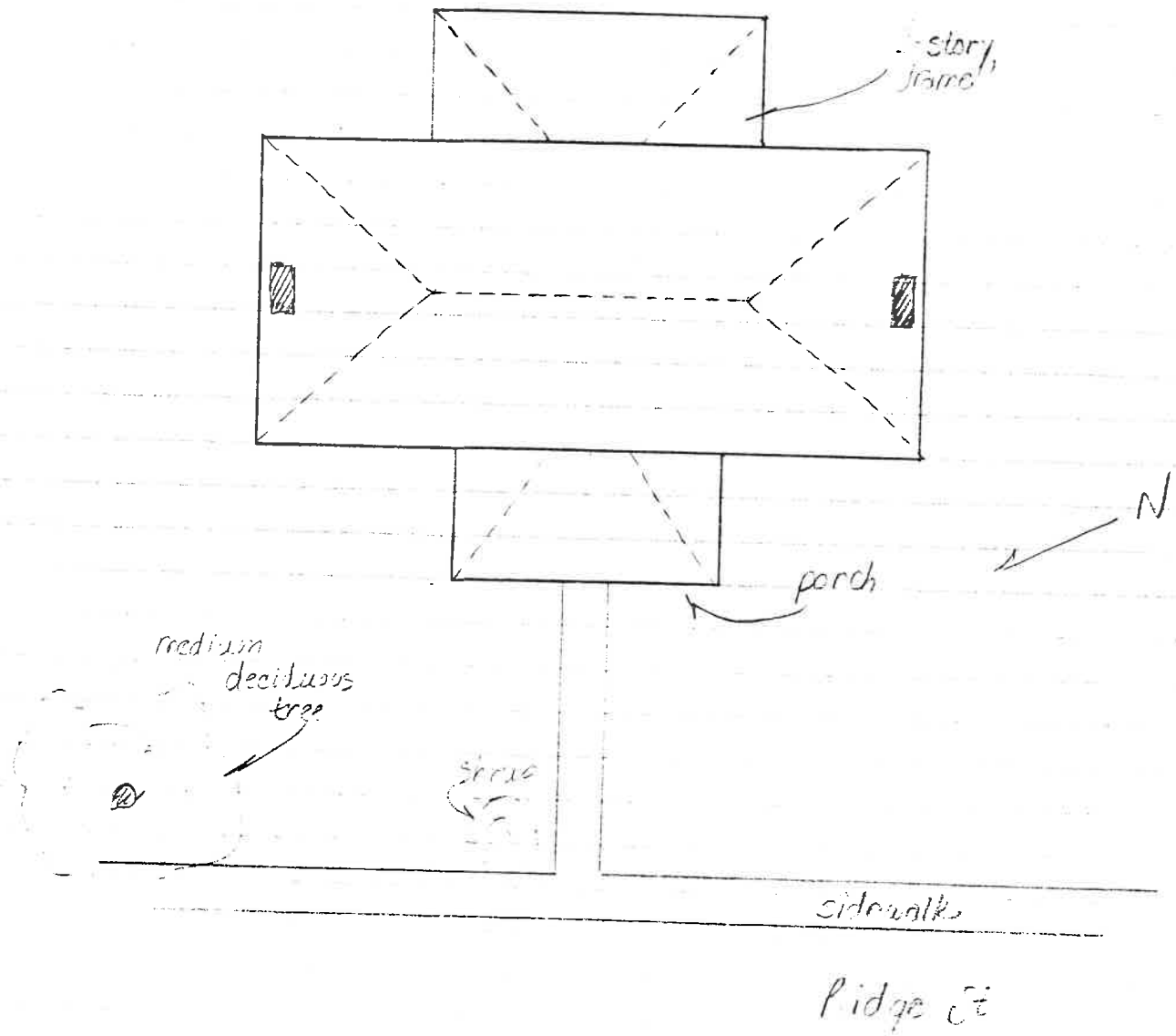

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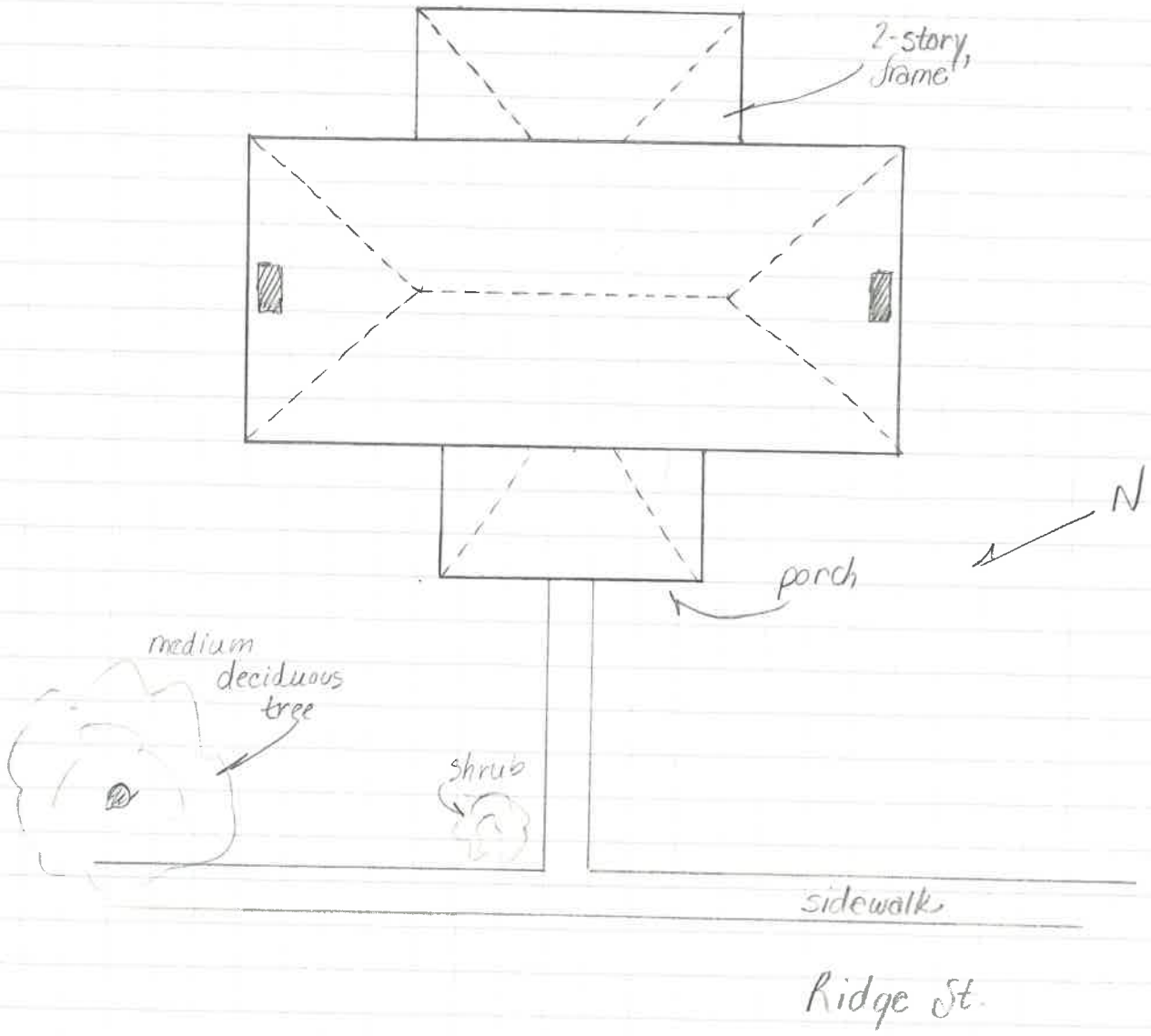
