BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of Charlottesville that the composition of the Market District Steering Committee shall be as follows, and the City Manager shall appoint members, taking into consideration recommendations as listed below:

- 2 members of the 2011 City Market Task Force with recommendations from the parks and recreation department and the Charlottesville Market District Alliance (CMDA)
- 2 City Market Vendors the vendor representative from the RFP review committee and one additional vendor recommended by the vendors
- 1 Charlottesville Market District Alliance representative CMDA representative from the RFP review committee
- 1 Market Central member recommended by Market Central
- 1 At-large member recommended by the Chamber of Commerce or Downtown Business Association of Charlottesville
- 1 developer recommended by the Office of Economic Development
- 1 member of the Farmers Market Coalition (FMC) recommended by the FMC

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Market District Steering Committee shall be assisted by the Director of Neighborhood Development Services, the Director of Parks and Recreation, the City Market Manager, and the Director of Economic Development.

The City of Charlottesville is pleased to participate in the coalition of localities that are represented in the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission's (TJPDC) application to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for the Thomas Jefferson Regional Brownfield Assessment and Planning Grant. Charlottesville shares the TJPDC's commitment to environmental stewardship and community development, both of which will be furthered by this project. Here, as in many communities, economic opportunities have fallen short of expectations in the recent past. We believe the investment in challenging properties made possible by this project will result in reinvestment and job creation that would not otherwise have occurred in the City of Charlottesville. Additionally, the project will establish the necessary steps to clean up pollution that potentially threatens our natural resources, health, and livelihood.

We are committed to participating in this project. We are excited to assist the TJPDC in the site selection process, and already have sites in mind that would benefit Charlottesville, our citizens, and the environment if determined to be eligible for assessment activities. 
AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CONVEYANCE OF CITY-OWNED PROPERTY ADJACENT TO THE PRESTON AVENUE RIGHT OF WAY TO REGION TEN COMMUNITY SERVICES BOARD, INC.

WHEREAS, Region Ten Community Services Board, Inc. ("Region Ten"), the owner of property designated as Parcel 39 on City Real Estate Tax Map 31 (800 Preston Avenue), wishes to acquire a portion of the adjoining City-owned property, previously used as a part of the Preston Avenue right of way, as shown on the attached plat dated September 12, 2012; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with <u>Virginia Code</u> Sec. 15.2-1800(B), a public hearing was held to give the public an opportunity to comment on the proposed conveyance of the City property as requested by Region Ten; and

WHEREAS, the City Assessor, Department of Neighborhood Services, and Department of Public Works have reviewed the proposed conveyance and have no objection thereto;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Charlottesville, Virginia that the Mayor is authorized to execute a deed of quitclaim, in form approved by the City Attorney, for that portion of the former Preston Avenue right of way, approximately 2,760 square feet in area, adjacent to Parcel 39 on City Tax Map 31, and shown on the attached plat dated September 12, 2012. No compensation will be due to the City for the conveyance. The City Attorney is hereby authorized to take whatever steps are necessary to effect the closing of said property conveyance.



RESOLUTION TO REQUEST THAT THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND GOVERNOR OF VIRGINIA ACCEPT AND IMPLEMENT THE FULL EXPANSION OF MEDICAID AS PROVIDED BY THE AFFORDABLE CARE ACT

WHEREAS, the City Council of Charlottesville, Virginia, represents all of the citizens of Charlottesville, Virginia; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court's decision protects a state from losing all its Medicaid federal matching dollars for its current Medicaid program if it fails to implement the Affordable Care Act Medicaid expansion; and

WHEREAS, Virginia's Medicaid program, despite its costs, does not rank well when compared to other states; and

WHEREAS, the Affordable Care Act Medicaid expansion changes this by establishing a new national income eligibility level at 133% Federal Poverty Level; and

WHEREAS, the Medicaid expansion is also an enormous benefit for the economy of Virginia;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of Charlottesville, Virginia, that the General Assembly and the Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia are requested to take action in connection with the next regular session of the General Assembly of Virginia to fully accept, implement, and enact the Medicaid Expansion of the Affordable Care Act.

RESOLUTION SUPPORT FOR THE SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL CLARK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TRAVEL PLAN and GRANT APPLICATION

WHEREAS, the City of Charlottesville supports the goals of the Safe Routes To School to enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk and bicycle to school, to make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative, thereby encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle from an early age, and to facilitate the planning, development, and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Charlottesville City Council supports the Safe Routes to School Travel Plan for Clark Elementary School, and approves the Safe Routes to School grant applications to implement the Travel Plan for Clark Elementary School in 2012; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council acknowledges that this is a locally-administered reimbursement project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Manager is hereby authorized to sign on behalf of the City of Charlottesville a funding agreement, in form approved by the City Attorney, with the Virginia Department of Transportation for implementation of the above-described Travel Plan.
