Mr. Huja shared the new wording for the state historic marker, concerning the surrender of Charlottesville near the University of Virginia. Mr. Huja stated that the University would like to see the marker placed at the police station on Ivy Road. He also commented that the University also controls Booker House on University Avenue. After a brief discussion, it was moved by Ms. Caperton and second by Mr. Ford to accept the new language and location for the state marker titled "Union Occupation of Charlottesville"

The minutes of April 11, 2001 were accepted as corrected.

There was discussion of a possible sign for the "Wine Makers House" based upon a request from Mr. Jeff Werner.

Mr. Huja reported that we are getting estimates of under grounding of utilities at Court Square. The initial indication is that the estimates from Dominion Virginia Power and Sprint will be higher than what we had expected. Ms. Caperton indicated that she would prepare a list of possible foundations that may be able to donate some funds for the court square improvements. Ms. Caperton also mentioned that Ann Miller of VDOT might also have some information. Mr. Huja commented that he would follow up on this matter.

There was a discussion of the tour book and its length. Mr. Beliles read e-mail from Mr. Garrett Smith, who was making a case for a longer version of the booklet. It was indicated that from the very start the parameters were that, the booklet would be small, similar to the Culpeper tour booklet. Mr. Huja stated that the book committee is asking for more money for the design layout of the booklet, which is in excess of what was originally agreed upon. Mr. Beliles stated that the committee has done good research, yet they have expanded beyond the original intent. The focus of the booklet should be on the Downtown and the University. This issue will be further discussed at the next meeting.

There was discussion of local makers, Mr. Beliles suggested that we should re-think the whole concept of local markers. The markers can be smaller with less wording and can be placed on the buildings, this way we can do a lot more of them. There was also a suggestion that the property owner may contribute towards the markers. Mr. Ford stated that there needs to be adequate information on the markers. He also felt that there could be some flexibility. Mr. Beliles distributed a list of potential locations for local historic markers. He also distributed a list of existing state highway markers in Charlottesville and Albemarle County.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 4:45 p.m. The next meeting will be June 13, 2001.

Letter from Garrett Smith, Chairman, ACHS Publications Committee

"We think the Task Force should reconsider its comments. We doubt the size of the booklet will scare tourists from buying it any more than it will impress them with C'ville's historical wealth and induce them to come back. To the extent that the book is large, it is not daunting due to its format which is not dense. It will be filled with pictures and maps and not large blocks of text. I'm not aware of that format deterring the purchasers of Michelin Guides, which I've always thought were more popular than more textual guides such as Baedeckers. If the guide is kept inexpensive, that won't be a burden either."

"Whether Lexis prints it for free or not has not been a concern of ours until now, although we were concerned when they suggested they'd do it free on some extra paper they had left over. We were hoping not to have our page size and format dictated by our printer, because we understood that obtaining funding would be taken care of by the Task Force. The ACHS Publications Committee volunteered to write the booklet, and we did so without instructions or parameters within which to work. Task Force members like Coy Barefoot and Mark Beliles have been members of our committee, and I believe were well aware of what we were doing all along. We have received no negative feedback about the size until now, although the basic draft has been ready for months.

For the Task Force to suggest we cut it down to save on publishing costs, is to suggest we should discard hours upon hours of work undertaken for the benefit of the City at the request of the Task Force simply because the Task Force has not done the fundraising we were led to believe it would undertake." "We're happy to think about Web versions. We already have. The Web is flexible and it will be to our advantage to use it."
