There was discussion of the McGuffey marker – possibly to be located at the end of the alley near Pavillion IX.

Mary Joy will contact Huja to find out who he contacts at UVA for placement of markers there.

Gennie mentioned that she would like to see some interpretation on Belmont bridge.

Huja may have photos of past events, such as the tour of markers around Court Square.

Stephanie Smith did the press releases and invitations - perhaps she kept a log?

In honor of preservation Month, there will be a speaker from Poplar Forest at the Senior center on May 24 at 6 pm. Sara Lee Barnes is the Chair of the County Historic Preservation Committee, who is organizing that event. libassoc@virginia.edu Mary Joy is to contact her and send regrets for not participating, saying there was not enough notice.

Regarding a possible update of the City's 1993 Historic Preservation Plan, Gennie is willing to chair that effort. She suggested getting involved in neighborhood association newsletters. We could schedule a time each month. First we need to get authorization by contacting Jim Tolbert again. The HRTF wants to be formally tasked by City Council to update the Historic Preservation Plan over the next year.

Gennie suggested asking Jean Hiatt to help, also Kaye Halsey and Coy Barefoot. Mark Beliles said he would try to contact Coy Barefoot.

The meeting was adjouned at 1:15p.m.

At the April meeting, Mark asked us to develop lists of some things the Task Force might address. Here is my unedited list in no particular priority order. Totally off the top of my head and possibly over the top, too.

Gennie

Continue state and local marker program, looking for other just as appropriate but alternative ways to identify and honor sites and individuals (publications, poster series, internet, exhibits, films, etc.) try to involve those associated with each site or individuals, investigate ordering and installing National Register plaques for all city districts and encourage privately listed properties to display theirs; provide a link to the NR website for our city listings

Coordinate with other city groups-the Department, BAR, Urban Design, neighborhood associations, Parks and Rec and local NGOs-Historical Soc., PP, APVA, Garden Clubs, Website, consider a film on local history with city assistance (Maurice Jones and others who worked on Jefferson School film?)-to play on internet and to play in lobby of city hall and other public places, could be used with sister cities, at schools, for ec development, etc.

Help to publicize events of others above-ie. Hist Soc events, APVA tours, PP programs

Look for non-traditional ways and places to engage citizens/visitors in our history such as the following:

City Hall lobby

City schools and playgrounds

New transit center

Buses

Trollies

Posters

Events

Paramount

MLK Performing Art Center

City-owned cemeteries

Spearhead update of Preservation Plan as part of Comp Plan; develop concept of interpretive plan as part of Preservation Plan; Develop proposal and find funding for an interpretive plan

Look for ways to get others to do part of our work, ie developers of new buildings or rehabilitations-interpretation inside and out-what used to be, people and events assoctd-work to encourage this whenever there is demolition or substantial change, work with local schools, churches, and other organizations to encourage histories or to share ones already done-web links

Give some insights into 19th and 20th century Charlottesville as well as the "Jeffersonian" through interpretation on downtown mall and West Main; is there a way to add interpretation to the city corridors?

Develop a theme list of trends/movements/ stories/places/people/groups, etc. to investigate and decide how best to interpret

Maybe a"how things work" for Cville-water, gas, railroads, streetcars, automobiles, phones, parking lots and garages, industries such as Woolen Mill and Ix Silk Mill, public recreation-when did we get these what was life like before, how did the transitions occur?

Acknowledge city responsibility for its role in segregation and Massive Resistance; work with Jefferson School group(s) to address this part of our history

Meet once a year with each neighborhood-even relatively new ones have histories Neighborhood walks/front porch events to talk about history, invite in oldtimers to tell stories to new ones, let new ones tell their coming to Cville stories

Do a film on Court Square-that addresses its colorful past and role as first "urban renewal-type" project in Charlottesville to complement the sanitized version on the ground; tie into groups that have done films and theater projects for Vinegar Hill

Coordinate with CIP-get involved with projects like the Belmont Bridge, West Main St beautification or whatever it is, the Mall rehabilitation, Meadowcreek Parkway if it happens (although I still hope not), park redesigns before they happen-make history part of the program in an integral way-Belmont Bridge and West Main could be "history walks" as well as aesthetic enhancements

Title: Historic Resource Task Force Status Report

<u>Background</u>: City Council appointed Historic Resource Task force in December of 1997 to better utilize historic resources of the community. The task force contains thirteen members from a broad spectrum of the community with knowledge of the City's historic resources. This group has been meeting monthly and has been involved in a variety of projects and activities.

The original charge for the task force was as follows:

- The development of heritage walking tours by private entrepreneurs and/or other organizations.
- Cultural events such as the Jefferson Thanksgiving, Colonial Christmas.
- Educational programs for adults and/or children, through the schools and other organizations, including community archaeology to learn the history of native Americans, colonial and civil war periods in Charlottesville.
- Historical plaques, sculptures or other public exhibits in public places and private businesses.
- Development of signs to identify historic buildings and sites related to individuals who contributed to local, regional or national history.
- Promotion or creation of museums or permanent exhibits of cultural history.

Their current projects include State Historic Markers, Local Historic Markers, Local History Exhibits, Court Square Enhancement Projects and Booklet on local history.

Budgetary Impact: The state historic markers cost approximately \$1500 per marker. The task force has been trying to place two historic markers every year. Local historic markers cost \$1000 per marker per year. The task force hopes to do two markers per year. The task force is also preparing a permanent historic display at the Union Train Station, which will cost about \$1000. There may be an additional expense of up to \$1000 for miscellaneous activities.

<u>Recommendations</u>: Staff recommend continuation of this task force as it is successfully working on its charge and many activities still need to be accomplished.
