Site Description:

2016: This property was surveyed in 2012-2016 by City of Charlottesville Neighborhood Development Services. The front of the lot has a concrete walkway leading from the sidewalk to the main entrance. Hedge plantings line the porch area and a privet hedge lines the front and side yards. There is a parged concrete post located at the start of the walkway in the front yard. Several large trees screen the side yards from view, including a large evergreen on the southeast corner. There is a large gravel parking area on the south side of the house which is shared with 418 10th Street NW. It appears at one point an alley ran behind this property but it is no longer function due to overgrowth of trees and shrubs.

January 2020: There is a shed along the northeast elevation and a shed in the west corner of the lot.

Surveyor Assessment:

2016: Ownership History

John West sold the property to George E. Walker on Nov. 10, 1891(County 97 – 179). George E. Walker sold the land to John D. Coles Jr. in 1901(County 121 – 307). The house remained in the Cole family until the 1970s.

Social History

For most of the 20th century, this home was lived in and owned by one African American family. From 1908 – 1950 John D. Coles Jr., a carpenter and Jennie D. Coles, his wife, lived in the house with their family including son, John H. Coles. As a carpenter, John D. Coles may have been involved in the design and construction of the house and outbuildings. Jennie Coles continued to live in the house after John's death (1956-1960). The house was then rented out to the Harris family, Ferris A. Harris, a stockman at UVA, his wife Virginia A. Harris, and their family (1961-1964).

Statement of Significance

The Coles family lived in and owned this home for over fifty years, making it a socially significant resource. John D. Coles, the original owner, may also have been involved with the design and construction of the house, as he was a carpenter by trade. It is also possible, as an early resident, he worked with other neighboring landowners to build homes on their property. The house is one of the older homes in the neighborhood and is well preserved.

2020: This property is located in the potential 10th & Page Historic District, which is recommended as potentially eligible for listing in the NRHP. Further study is recommended to determine if the 10th & Page Historic District is eligible for listing in the NRHP under Criterion A in the areas of Ethnic Heritage, Community Planning and Development, and Social History, and under Criterion C in the area of Architecture. This property includes one contributing primary resource and two non-contributing secondary resources.

2016: This three-bay, two-story, frame and stucco house was built around 1908. The current dwelling has a cross gable, asphalt shingle roof and a central interior parged chimney. Across the façade is a two-bay, hipped roof porch with a parged concrete foundation, decorative folk Victorian wood turned posts and wood railing. There is an L-shaped two-story, two-bay rear hipped roof addition that fits with the original crossgable house to form a rectangular wing. The front-facing windows are 2/2 wood sash type, with one square fixed window on the northeast side. The front door has a wood single-light transom.
