ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

This is a typical, but nicely detailed, two-storey, three-bay, single-pile brick house with a full basement which is above ground in the rear. The rather low-pitched gable roof is covered with standing-seam tin and has an additional central gable on the facade and a bracketed boxed cornice. The brick is laid in five-course Americanwith-Flemish bond (five stretcher courses, one header-stretcher course), the foundation in five-course American bond. The double-sash windows are two-over-two light with wooden sills and plain surrounds. Those on the facade have a sort of bracketed pediment echoing the shape of the roofline with its low central gable. A one-storey entrance porch with low hip roof covers the central bay of the facade. It has a bracketed boxed cornice with dentil mouldings, plain frieze, chamfered posts with sawn brackets, and an arcaded sawn balustrade. Before 406 Ridge Street was altered, the two houses differed primarily in the details of the porches. The four-paneled entrance door has a three-light rectangular transom. The interior follows the central hall plan with two rooms on each of the three levels. The original kitchen and dining roof were in the basement, and all six rooms had fireplaces.

HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION

In 1881 William Dyer Wheeler purchased a 1.16 acre lot on Ridge Street, part of the Luthern Church property, the church being on Parrott Street behind this lot and the adjoining one. (ACDB 78-121) Tax records show that he built one house in 1881 and another beside it before 1887. A higher tax appraisal indicates that the Wheelers may have lived at 400 Ridge Street at one time, but both houses were later used as rental property. Mr. Wheeler died in 1906 and Mrs. Wheeler in 1927, leaving 406 Ridge Street to their niece Frances Morrow O'Brien and 400 Ridge Street to her daughter Frances (City WB 3-213). The O'Briens continued to use both houses as rental property. Bertie B. Yancey (Mrs. Albert Yancey, Sr.), who lived in the fine old Dice house across the street, purchased both houses from the O'Briens in 1945 (City DB 120-310), and in 1951 deeded them to her two daughters (DB 159-380). Julia Yancey Alderman conducted the popular Ridgelawn Kindergarten in her home at 400 Ridge Street for many years. She sold the house in 1962 to W.E. Jackson (DB 232-263) who converted the basement into a separate apartment. His family still owns the house and uses it as rental property.





A one-storey entrance porch with low hip roof shelters the central bay of the facade. Before 406 Ridge Street was altered, the two houses were nearly identical, differing primarily in the details of the porches. The four-paneled entrance door has a three-light rectangular transom. 


