Miscellaneous descriptive information (plan, exterior and interior decoration, cornice/eave type, window type and trim, chimneys, additions, alterations)

This handsome example of Neo Classical public architecture occupies a terraced lot along Rugby Road just north of Fayerweather Hall.

The building remains virtually unaltered on the exterior. At the rear is a large, windowless wing that may be a later addition.

Historical information

This museum was made possible largely through a large contribution by Mrs. It elyn Bayly Tiffany and a grant from the Public Works Administration.

For a decade in the 1960s the museum was inoperative while being used as classroom space by the School of Architecture, but is now handsomely refurbished. It is the only major art museum in Charlottesville.

155: We story; trick (Flemion bond) N5 bay; perimented sortico supported by 2 Donic columns; Colonial Revival; his new full entablature, dental conice; high tasement; 1st fleet blind windows; sillo supported on conoples; see lected sillasters; perimented from flame at entrance, set into glass wall at entrance tay; circular and hexagonal panals decorate portico and above side tay windows; marble bettcourse; taternacle treatment of entrance loggia; centralizar, symmetrical composition.

Built at a cost of \$150,000, funded in part by the Public Works administration (38,000);
Occupied by School of architecture in 1960's, romovated in 1971 to return to original intent as art museum.
